
# **The Beans'Talk:** Update from Mark and Patti Bean Translating God's Word for Quechua speakers in central Peru

While he acknowledged the fact that they have the New Testament, he went on to say that someday they will finally have all of God's Word in one nice big book.

It must seem like we are taking forever to finish the Bible. The people waiting for it probably wonder what our problem is. We're working hard. There's still a lot to do to bring the five Bibles to completion.

The past few months we've been copying and selling small flash drives with the recorded New Testament and hymnbook in two different Quechua languages. In one Quechua town, the crowd was particularly dubious that the New Testament could shrink to such a tiny size. The guys selling the flash drives on that occasion challenged the crowd to name any chapter in the New Testament. Then one would look up the number for that chapter in the little booklet that accompanies the flash drives, and the other man coded the number into the player. Voilá! Over and over people called out chapters and the crowd marveled as they listened to the beginning of each chapter in Quechua.

We didn't take enough flash drives with us when we were out earlier this month. We sold out before the first day was over.

The weekend following the women's convention Mark spoke at the anniversary of the Huallaga Bible dedication. The organizers wanted me to participate. "Please sing," they asked. Alas, musical is not an adjective used to describe me. I said I'd do it if Mark was at my side to start us on a decent note!
