Dear praying friends,


We hope that your celebration of Christmas was blessed by the Lord, and that the new year has started well for you. The Macedonian Christmas is actually celebrated on January 7th, in keeping with Eastern Orthodox tradition. Here New Years is a larger event than Christmas, with presents exchanged and a tree ('elka') decorated on January 1. On Christmas day, one tradition is the baking of a large loaf of bread called a Πογαγα (Pogacha) which contains a single coin. The bread is divided between family members, and the one who receives the coin is said to expect good luck in the coming year.

As we look back on 2015, we are moved with thankfulness for God's provision in our return to ministry in Macedonia. Thank you for your prayers for Cindy's visa. We are happy to share that her visa has been approved, just in time before her 90 day 'tourist' visa expires!
