It was great that all of the teens from the children's home were able to come to the church retreat along with the director of the home. It worked out beautifully. The teens attended all of the adult meetings on spiritual gifts. We had several tours in the neighborhood and only one special meeting for the kids alone. Our group is standing in front of the famous St. Barbara Church in Baernbach, Austria that we visited. The church was re-designed by Friedenreich Hundertwasser. We also visited the

Lipizzaner Stud Farm Piber in Styria, Austria.

The church people included the kids in everything that we did and they loved it. The director thought it worked out very well. She and I were able to get to know each other better during the retreat. One of the wonderful things that happened was that one of the girls from the home gave a testimony about how God helped her. Her brother even asked if he could say a prayer up front.



At church the next week I had a talk with the girl. I asked her if she sees her family. The older brother is no longer in the children's home. When he was there he kept pressing her about her being Muslim. Her mother often sees her in a mall in the neighborhood. She tries to avoid her, because she keeps telling her she has to wearing a <u>Burqa</u>.



As we talked, I asked her if she was muslim. She said, "No, I'm a Christian, you know, like you are." I was really happy to hear how sure she was about her commitment to Jesus.



In the end we were given permission to give a Bible to all of the children in the home if they said "I want one" — which of course they all did! Amazing how God works, isn't it! That director back then is the one who came to our retreat.
