2.	Ancient genealogies usually traced lineage through men, yet Matthew includes five women. Write down what you know about each of them. What is striking about the lives of these people? Why would Matthew draw attention to these aspects of Jesus' lineage? (Hunter, p. 12)

3.	Notice the repetition Matthew uses in the genealogy. He deviates from the pattern in 1:16. What is the significance of the names in Jesus' genealogy and what is Matthew communicating to his readers about Jesus?

6.	Why do the wise men travel from the east to Jerusalem (2:1-2)? After the wise men informed Herod of Micah 5:2, what insight do they give to Herod about Jesus? What is Herod's response and true motive?
7.	Read Exodus 1:15-22 and 2:11-15. Consider in what ways Herod's actions in Matthew 2:13 parallel those of the Pharaoh of Egypt.
8.	What expression is repeated in Matthew 2:15, 17-18, and 23? What is Matthew trying to show us about the relationship between Old Testament expectations and the arrival of Jesus?
9.	Compare the responses of Herod and the Wise Men to Jesus' birth. How are they similar to the responses that people give today to the Good News that Christ has come into the world?
10.	Summarize Matthew Chapters 1-2 in your own words.
