# Familiarity with <u>sacred</u> things has a dreadful tendency to make men <u>despise</u> them.

*Genesis 1:26-28*: Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness. And let them have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over the livestock and over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth.

So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.

And God blessed them. And God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it, and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth."

*Genesis 2:18-25:* Then the LORD God said, <u>"It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make him a helper fit for him." Now out of the ground the LORD God had formed every beast of the field and every bird of the heavens and brought them to the man to see what he would call them. And whatever the man called every living creature, that was its name. The man gave names to all livestock and to the birds of the heavens and to every beast of the field. But for Adam there was not found a helper fit for him. So the LORD God caused a deep sleep to fall upon the man, and while he slept took one of his ribs and closed up its place with flesh. And the rib that the LORD God had taken from the man he made into a woman and brought her to the man. Then the man said,</u>

"This at last is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh; she shall be called Woman, because she was taken out of Man."

Therefore, a man shall leave his father and his mother and hold fast to his wife, and they shall become one flesh. And the man and his wife were both naked and were not ashamed.

# John Walton

The word "helper" is common enough as a description of someone who comes to the aid of or provides a service for someone. It carries no implications regarding the relationship or relative status of the individuals involved. In fact, the noun form of the word found in this verse as used elsewhere refers almost exclusively to God as the One who helps his people. If we expand our investigation to verbal forms, we find a continuing predominance of God as the subject. Nothing suggests a subservient status of the one helping.

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#### Fall

*Genesis 3:8–11*: And they heard the sound of the LORD God walking in the garden in the cool of the day, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the LORD God among the trees of the garden. But the LORD God called to the man and said to him, "Where are you?" And he said, "I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked, and I hid myself." He said, "Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten of the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?"

#### Fall

- Relationship with <u>God</u> is fractured
- Relationship with each <u>other</u> is destroyed
- Relationship with <u>self</u> is damaged
- Relationship with <u>creation</u> is complicated

In contrast to our predecessors, who looked to their marriage to help them survive, we look to our marriage to meet our <u>needs</u> for passion and intimacy and to facilitate our voyages of self-discovery and personal growth.

# Redemption

*Romans 5:1–11*: Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ. Through him we have also obtained access by faith into this grace in which we stand, and we rejoice in hope of the glory of God. Not only that, but we rejoice in our sufferings, knowing that suffering produces endurance, and endurance produces character, and character produces hope, and hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us.

For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die—but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life. More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

#### Consummation

*Matthew 22:23–33*: The same day Sadducees came to him, who say that there is no resurrection, and they asked him a question, saying, "Teacher, Moses said, 'If a man dies having no children, his brother must marry the widow and raise up offspring for his brother.' Now there were seven brothers among us. The first married and died, and having no offspring left his wife to his brother. So too the second and third, down to the seventh. After them all, the woman died. In the resurrection, therefore, of the seven, whose wife will she be? For they all had her."

But Jesus answered them, "You are wrong, because you know neither the Scriptures nor the power of God. For in the resurrection they neither marry nor are given in marriage, but are like angels in heaven. And as for the resurrection of the dead, have you not read what was said to you by God: 'I am the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob'? He is not God of the dead, but of the living." And when the crowd heard it, they were astonished at his teaching.

For married Christians, there is also comfort in taking seriously "till death do us part." Marriage between one man and one woman is a beautiful gift of God, but it cannot bear the weight of serving as your <u>ultimate</u> end. Attempting to make it do so will lead to frustration, bitterness, and dissolution—or the idolatry of spouse-or child-worship. Such is the misstep of our age.

#### Consummation

*Revelation 7:9–12*: After this I looked, and behold, a great multitude that no one could number, from every nation, from all tribes and peoples and languages, standing before the throne and before the Lamb, clothed in white robes, with palm branches in their hands, and crying out with a loud voice, "Salvation belongs to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb!" And all the angels were standing around the throne and around the elders and the four living creatures, and they fell on their faces before the throne and worshiped God, saying, "Amen! Blessing and glory and wisdom and thanksgiving and honor and power and might be to our God forever and ever! Amen."

#### *Zechariah* 8:16-17

These are the things you are to do: Speak the truth to each other, and render true and sound judgment in your courts; do not plot evil against each other, and do not love to swear falsely. I hate all this," declares the LORD. Spouses can re-evaluate their expectations (A):

Is this expectation <u>un-biblical</u>? If so, it needs to be <u>removed</u>.

 Is this expectation a product of my own family of origin, personality/disposition, or likes/dislikes (preferences)? If so, how can I hold <u>lightly</u> to them, and hold tightly to God's plan- my spouse's <u>sanctification</u>?

#### Spouses can re-evaluate their responses (C):

- Is my response informed by our shared <u>context</u> and environment?
- Is my response informed by what my spouse has gone through today?
- Is this an opportunity for me to give <u>grace</u> or overlook in <u>love</u>?
- Is my response Spirit-filled or is it my flesh demanding what I want?
- Is my response going to help us <u>build</u> peace or <u>break</u> peace?
- At the end of the day am I trying to conform my spouse into my image or into the image of Christ?

• Have a <u>plan</u> for addressing conflict in marriage

- Identify your <u>default</u> in conflict
  - Fight
    Fake
    Flight

• Identify the <u>real</u> problem

• Pay <u>attention</u> to your posture, timing, and tone

I cannot think of a more essential <u>ingredient</u> in marriage than forgiveness.

# Walter Wangerin Jr.

When Christ is the single most solid reality upon which you stand; when in faith you find the source of your own life in him; when you yourself do dwell within his loving mercy and his forgiveness, then you are empowered to forgive your spouse, infinitely. Christ is the well from which to draw the water for your thirsty wife or husband. But this must be remembered: only as you know Jesus' <u>limitless</u> forgiveness for you are you able limitlessly to <u>share</u> forgiveness with your spouse.

# Three movements in forgiveness

- *Feels compassion*:  $\sigma \pi \lambda \alpha \gamma \chi \nu_1 \sigma \theta \epsilon i \varsigma$
- *Releases him from the debt*: ἀπέλυσεν
- Forgives him of the debt: ἀφῆκεν

# Colossians 2:13-14

And you, who were dead in your trespasses and the uncircumcision of your flesh, God made alive together with him, having forgiven us all our trespasses, by canceling the record of debt that stood against us with its legal demands. This he set aside, nailing it to the cross.

# John MacArthur

This kind of behavior seems unthinkable, even bizarre, and it is hard to believe someone could act in such a way. And that is exactly the Lord's point to Peter and the other disciples. For a Christian to be unwilling to forgive one another is unthinkable and <u>bizarre</u>.

# John Piper

If we hold fast to an unforgiving spirit, we will not be forgiven by God. If we continue on in that way, then we will not go to heaven, because heaven is the dwelling place of forgiven people.

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# Colossians 3:13

Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you.

To claim that I have been forgiven by God but I cannot forgive myself <u>betrays</u> that I do not understand, believe, or appreciate the gospel of Jesus Christ. It is a sinister attempt of the Enemy to get us to depend upon our own righteousness, rather than the grace of God.

## Four Promises of Forgiveness

- 1. "I will not dwell on this incident."
- "I will not bring up this incident again and use it against you."
- 3. "I will not talk to others about this incident."
- 4. "I will not let this incident stand between us or hinder our personal relationship."

You simply can't continually <u>rehearse</u> in your heart all someone's perceived wrongs against you and grow in affection toward him or her. You can't argue with yourself daily that the person you live with is the chief cause of the wrongs that you do and want to move close to them.
